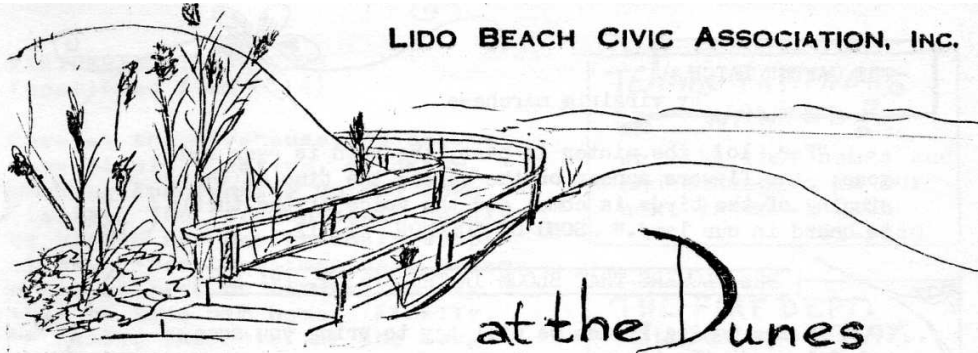

FIFTEEN GOOD MEN

The siren blares! The air horns pound the silence! What does all this mean to you? If you are a volunteer, a member of the local fire department, it means your neighbor is in trouble. Someone's life may be in danger or a cherished home threatened.

The local fireman springs into action. All else ceases. No matter the time of day or activity at that moment, the primary thought in his mind is "I might have to save a life." Stop for a moment and think. What and who comprise THE local fire department? In name it is the Point Lookout - Lido Fire Department. Three stations house eight pieces of firefighting and rescue equipment. Our Lido Headquarters, located on Lido Blvd. near the entrance to the Junior High School, contains a 1,000 gallon per minute pumper, a flood light and utility truck, and an ambulance. Our Point Lookout station has a rescue van, a telemetry-equipped ambulance, a 1,500 per min. pumper, a 750 gal. per min. pumper, and a 75 foot Tower Ladder.

All of our equipment is "top of the line", comparable to that used by the finest and most progressive departments in the world. Particularly important is our telemetry ambulance, designed as a pre-hospital coronary care unit. Patients' vital signs are transmitted by radio to the hospital.

Among our neighbors here in Lido, there are 15 who are actively involved in this service. Ideally we should number 30 since not everyone can be available for every call. In Point Lookout, our most active contingent numbers about 50. We all work together.

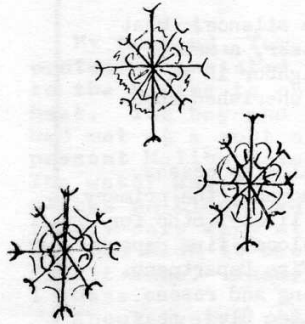
Two years ago our department was presented with an award for proficiency by the New York Daily News for stopping a fire at the Lido Hotel nightclub. The award was in recognition of preventing extensive damage to the structure.

Many of our firefighters are being trained in emergency medical care. In Lido and The Point our men perform these duties as professionals and often resemble the stars on the television show Emergency.

WEATHERING THE STORMS

Yes, we had a winter this winter of '76, but listen, my friends, while I remember-

Before we moved to 7 Biarritz St., my mother-in-law was living here and Lido Beach was snowed in for three days. Supplies were running low and people became very anxious about reaching the stores. Mr. Harold Gates, who lived on the same street, organized a group of men and, working steadily, they dug the whole street out. Quite a feat indeed!

While we were living at Lido Beach, Hurricane Donna hit, in 1960. The Lido Hotel had leveled a stretch of dunes to make a parking lot. As a result, Allevard and Bath Streets were both flooded up to six feet during the storm. We were fortunate. The water did not go over the curb except near the end of our street. Our phone was one of the few, perhaps the only one, working and the firemen kept coming to use it. Mrs. Green, our next door neighbor, told me that firemen had offered to evacuate them to the firehouse in Lido. She told them, "No, thanks, the firehouse is lower than we are."

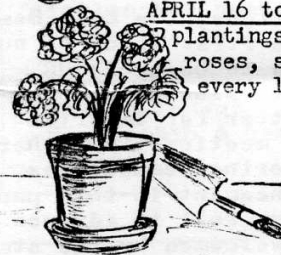
In the coming issues we will try to bring you some helpful gardening tips.

MARCH 20 to 31 Plant small trees and shrubs. Sow sweet peas outdoors.

APRIL 1 to 15 Plant roses. Plant hardy perennials. Set out pansies, English daisies, Canterbury bells, hollyhocks, foxgloves and sweet williams.

APRIL 16 to 30 Plant gladiolus: make repeated plantings every two weeks until July 15. Prune roses, spray and dust with fungicides; repeat every 10 days through the season.

Sow seeds outdoors of:



- Annual candytuft
- Four o'clocks
- Annual poppies
- Annual chrysanthemums
- Cornflowers
- Pinks
- Morning glories

Prune away dead branches from shrubs and destroy.

Once at the firehouse, he became very lively - eating, drinking, smoking and running up and down stairs. The firemen could hardly be blamed for having their suspicions. When the atmosphere became a bit chilly, he offered to pay them to take him home. Finally, he called the chief of the Long Beach Fire Dept. to complain that the Lido firemen weren't hospitable.

Hurricane Belle, last summer, was the most recent hurricane to hit Lido Beach. Unlike Hurricane Donna, there were plenty of warnings. After listening to almost hourly reports on TV, our faith in the dunes, which had seen us safely through Hurricane Donna, was now shaken. At seven o'clock, when high tide was supposed to coincide with the full fury of the storm, Tom and I went down to the beach to check the tide. To our surprise, we found quite a few of our neighbors from Biarritz and Nantwick Streets doing the same thing. The water was up to the foot of the boardwalk. While we discussed the possibility of the ocean's rising any further, we became quite jovial. If it hadn't been raining at the time, I think we would have stayed and had an impromptu beach party right then. We were talking of having cocktails and a tide-watching party, but without shelter, we eventually went home. Luckily, we weathered the storm with very little damage. The people of Lido Beach have shown that when adversity strikes or when problems arise, they can band together and meet them head on. It is this spirit that makes Lido Beach a nice place to live.

My husband, Tom, over my protests, insisted on going to the Marina to check his boat. The bay and the ocean had met at a spot near the present Malibu Beach Club. The water was very deep in places on Lido Blvd. and over twenty cars were stranded. How Tom made it back, even he didn't know. Sheer luck, I guess.

About twelve years later, Lido Beach was again hit by a snow storm that left it isolated for three days. The drifts on the north side of Lido Blvd. were about five feet high. People worked hard to dig out their driveways but when the snowplows finally cleared the Blvd., all the snow was pushed back into the driveways that had been so laboriously dug out.

When that blizzard first hit, the firemen spent the night in the Lido firehouse. The next day they had some amusing stories to tell. For instance, one man who was stuck in the snow claimed he had a heart condition that made it dangerous for him to wade through the snow. A doctor confirmed that the man did indeed have a weak heart and the firemen had to carry him through hip-deep snow.

Dunes Study

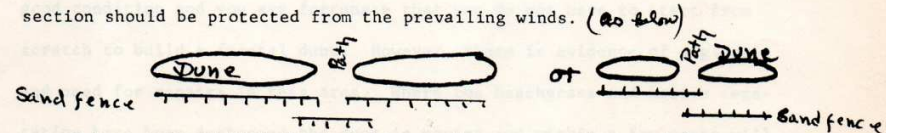
Hurricane Donna caused considerably flooding and damage to Lido Beach in 1960. As a result of this study, beach grass was planted to stabilize the dunes. This stabilization has proven successful.

SURVEY OF LIDO BEACH

At the request of some of the townspeople of Hempstead, I had the opportunity to evaluate the condition of Lido Beach on May 24, 1969. I met with Messrs Lester Knopping, Peter Zaharko, and I. W. Harkow Saturday morning and walked along the beach area to examine and evaluate the condition of the frontal dune.

Beginning west of the parking area there is a definite need to build up the level of the section by the formation of a frontal dune for the protection of the homes in the immediate vicinity from water and high tides during hurricane storms. (I understand that high water entered this area during Hurricane Donna in 1960 and that the damage to homes here was tremendous.) It is advisable, then, to use sand fences to build a higher dune. The existing sand fence should be repaired and areas already in beachgrass should be fertilized now with 700-800 lbs of granular commercial grade 10-10-10 fertilizer. This beachgrass will aid in building and will protect the sand dune.

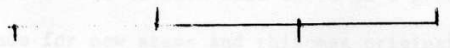
As we walked to the east along the shore there was evidence of broken sand fences that badly need repair as well as eroded areas that need new sand fences to collect sand and restore the frontal dune. Paths made by summer traffic need repair, especially the eroded dune areas on each side of the path. These areas should have a boardwalk and the path section should be protected from the prevailing winds. (As below)



I have noticed that the town has spent money erecting sand fences for stilling sand and building a frontal dune. I believe that this is an excellent practice and it does work. However, the job is only half

done if beachgrass is not planted the following year (this has not been done) on the sand that has collected. The next storm will remove all the sand that has accumulated and the sand fences will begin to break down. Thus one has lost all that was originally accomplished from the use of the sand fence. It is absolutely necessary and I cannot stress its importance enough to plant the areas to beachgrass after sand has begun to accumulate. Sand fences are only temporary and just a waste of money and effort if the project is not completed by planting beachgrass for permanent cover.

Dunes require constant maintenance to insure success. Fences that are damaged by vandals or by coastal storms should be repaired promptly. Sand can be lost faster that it can be collected. Short 8-10' spurs placed 25-30' apart along both sides of the sand fence prevent cross-winds from removing collected sand.



If a broader dune is desired, another fence may be erected several years later in front of and parallel to the old fence. Beach areas are limited, sometimes rather narrow, and are continuously subjected to blowing sand and flooding. It is necessary that beachgrass be established at Lido Beach since these conditions exist there.

Fortunately, the frontal dune along Ocean Boulevard is in fairly good condition and you are fortunate that you do not have to start from scratch to build a frontal dune. However, there is evidence of neglect and need for repairs in this area. Where the beachgrass and native vegetation have been destroyed the dune is moving and within a few years will be depositing sand on the highway. This then creates an added problem of sand removal, hazardous driving, sand blasting of cars and homes. It also means that the moving dune must be stopped by revegetation. The problem

The Dunes, our vital protector to safeguard our community against storm and hurricane damage and losses are being neglected and, as a result, are eroding and shifting. The need for urgent repair is imperative for in time, the Dunes will lose their effectiveness as storm barriers.

Because of the importance of the restoration involved, expert consultation was necessary. Professor John Zak, University of Massachusetts, a Dune expert, was invited to our community to study our Dunes and to submit his findings and recommendations to our association.

is quite severe since it is costly to arrest a moving dune, restore the dune, and establish native vegetation. In the long run it is cheaper to repair and maintain a dune than to neglect it until it is so badly damaged that the cost of restoration becomes prohibitive. Certainly the nice homes in this area need the protection of this frontal dune and repairs should be made as soon as possible to prevent further deterioration. Just the erection of sand fences will not solve the problem.

Summer traffic is a problem and visitors should be kept out of areas planted to beachgrass and those in native beachgrass. This plant will not tolerate very much traffic and can be killed easily. Planted areas should be screened off for protection. Rugosa rose should also be planted along walks to confine visitors and keep them off the beachgrass areas.

Just a few words on beachgrass. We are most fortunate to have a plant like American beachgrass. It grows in clumps which contain many stems likely to grow 2-3' tall. At the base of each stem there is a group of nodes from which roots and buds for new stems and rhizomes originate. Beachgrass survives even if buried because then growth takes place between the lower nodes, bringing nodes closer to the surface to start new roots and stems. The deeper the plant is buried, the longer the internodes become. Beachgrass will grow easily through a foot of deposited sand. The grass sends out rhizomes for distances of 5-6' and new plants are produced from nodes along the rhizome.

along footpaths, rugosa rose be planted to keep people from walking onto the beachgrass area. Bayberry, rugosa rose, and beach plum should be planted after the dune has been stabilized. Do not fertilize these plants the first year. Plant them in a mixture of natural peat and sand (1-2 or 1-1). Planting holes can be prepared with this mixture a month before actual planting. The plants should be mulched with hay, peat moss, or any available material. The following year they should be fertilized with Castor pomace, 400-500 lbs per acre or a handful around each plant.

Stabilization of dunes is very costly and a great deal of expense can be avoided if the natural vegetative cover is preserved and damaged areas are repaired before they encompass larger areas.

I am very much concerned about beach and dune erosion. It is gratifying that some of you town leaders are interested in the conservation of the beach area and its value to the people of your community. It is not too late to start repairs, but I must emphasize that just the placement of a sand fence along the waterfront will not solve the problem. Much more in time, money, and effort is needed to stabilize the beach area. If money is limited, sections should be done each year until the whole area is completed.

PLAN FOR DUNE CONTROL WORK AT LIDO BEACH

I would suggest that the present sand fences on the frontal dune be repaired. Also, spurs 8' long should be placed about 30' apart along both sides of the fence where there is evidence of sand having been blown away in the past. Any new fences erected at a later date should be placed according to this pattern. The construction of fences appears to be correctly placed at right angles to the prevailing winds. In areas where winds are severe the poles holding the sand fence should be placed 8' apart and secured firmly with guy wires.

After the sand has been collected over the winter beachgrass should be planted on both sides of the fence, with a spacing of about 3' between rows and 18" between plants. Plant 3-5 culms (stems) per hill. Plant them at least 6" deep and fertilize with 700-800 lbs per acre of granular 10-10-10 fertilizer after planting. I would also recommend that 2-3 weeks after planting the area be restocked to replace skips and dead beachgrass. Topdress with 100 lbs of urea or ammonium nitrate per acre during the summer and again the first part of September. The next spring the area should be full of beachgrass.

Beachgrass can be planted in the fall of the year in protected areas. Spring planting is good after the severe winds have subsided. As hot weather approaches in summer the survival of beachgrass is poor unless the plants are watered.

The planted area should be posted to keep foot traffic away as planted beachgrass cannot withstand physically the pressure from a great number of people and beach buggies that traffic through the dunes.

I would also suggest that wherever it is possible and especially

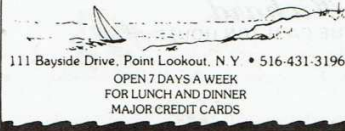

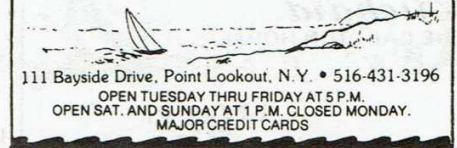



In another case, the Title Guarantee and Trust Company claimed that the Town of Hempstead never owned Long Beach and therefore never had the right to sell it to Reynolds. It was pointed out, however, that in 1645 the council of the Town of Hempstead voted the Town Clerk 1 pound 5 shillings "for drinks expended on ye Sagamore (Indians) for laying out ye towne bounds." The Dongan Patent of 1685 followed this boundary and Long Beach was included in the town.

In other areas, in 1941 Abe Simon fought Joe Louis for the World's Heavyweight Championship title. Mr. Simon, as a former Long Beach policeman, was greeted by the city administration and given a large check to be cashed if he won the fight. The administration's interest in economy would not be threatened by this gesture, as the outcome of the fight was widely anticipated.

The Long Beach school faculty put on a memorable performance of "You Can't Take it With You." Starring were Alice Hatch (Mrs. Greenbaum), Ed Young, Edna Klages, Ed Coen, Joe Borzelleri and Evelyn Steiner.

The war in Europe was beginning to have its effect on the community. British children came to Long Beach as the community became involved with the foster parents plan headed by Ann Elias. In addition, the local papers began listing the names of Long Beach boys who were being drafted and of those who were enlisting in the armed forces of our country. Some of the names were Douglas McCoy, Murray Jacovitz, Louis Sarantopoulos, William McCarthy, Frank Trask, Clemente Favata, Alexander Forbes, Mario LaRocca, Frank Centemore, William Carroll, Leo Weiner and Ralph Marinaccio. The war was also brought home to Long Beach when Senator Claude Pepper of Florida came to this community to speak on a coast to coast broadcast over the Mutual Broadcast Company (WOR) at the Lindell School on the growing danger of Nazi Germany.

School District matters were quite complex in the year 1941. It all seemed peaceful at first. The year saw the school board election, the budget meeting, the school board election, the school board election, the school board election, and second was Howard Kaminsky with 93.6. The school board election saw a three way race between Charles McAvoy, Morris Kaufman and Arthur Perlmutter. McAvoy and Kaufman ran as a team and Perlmutter, the independent, was managed by Milton Popper. McAvoy and Perlmutter won but that didn't calm things down. The school board budget meeting of that year lasted from 7:30 p.m. to 4 a.m. It started with 700 people and wound up with 40. It was the practice at this time for the people at the meeting to vote on the budget. One of the controversial matters was the appointment of Mrs. Daugherty (later Mrs. Murray) to the post of Executive Secretary to the board at a small salary. As the evening wore on Mrs. Daugherty received more and more praise. Mr. Louis Freidman said "Mrs. Daugherty knows as much in her little finger as the whole damn bunch" (meaning the rest of the board). Everything was contested, however. They could not decide on procedure, who would chair the meeting or just about anything else. After everything was finally passed at about 4 a.m., Mr. Maurice Canter of 55 West Broadway took the entire situation to court, pointing out that only 55 people passed on the budget, which made it illegal. He lost the case.

This was the year that the School District ran out of money as it was unable to borrow on anticipation of taxes. Teachers were paid for only half a month due to the lack of funds. Eventually, the South Shore Trust Company loaned the School District \$20,000 at 2 per cent interest to meet the payroll. Mrs. Daugherty resigned from the board in 1941 and was succeeded by John J. Murray, who became President.

The local elections began peacefully enough. The Democratic Party, under the leadership of Teddy Ornstein and Mike Reich, seemed united and designated Ornstein for Mayor, for City Council, Mr. Nugent, Mr. Xanthaky and Mr. Florea, who replaced Mr. Elias on the ticket. The Republicans, who were a constant minority, sought to overcome this problem by creating a Fusion Ticket with Carlino running for Supervisor, former Mayor Gold for mayor and Joe Gerson with Raymond Sweeney for council. However, this time it was the Republicans who had a primary. Wildfred Thompson challenged the leadership of Carlino by putting up his own ticket. He ran for mayor against Gold while Democrat Percy Elias ran against Carlino. In the primary the result was a split Republican ticket. Thompson defeated Gold but Carlino defeated Elias. It all added up to little in the November election. Ornstein and his ticket swept into office to now begin a full term as Mayor of Long Beach.

World War II dominated the thinking and actions of the people of Long Beach in the year 1942. Newspaper stories refer to scrap drives, gasoline rationing, bond drives, the draft lottery, blackouts, civilian defense, air raid wardens and other words which formed the lexicon of WW II.

In 1942 the peacetime draft of the previous year was replaced by the draft lottery of the war. George Spring of 461 West Penn Street was the first resident eligible for the armed services under the lottery. Lt. Tom Ireland saw action in New Guinea. Richard Larson, who was in combat at Guadalcanal and Bougainville, was killed in a plane accident. Matt Bills of 38 Chester St. was killed at Pearl Harbor. A rally at the Community Center saw a crowd of over 1,100 people listen to speakers including Mr. Howard Greenberg, an air raid instructor and teacher in the Long Beach schools, explain the duties of an air raid warden. Long Beach held "send off" parties for those entering the armed forces. The Lido Hotel was taken over by the navy to be used as a naval receiving station. One thousand guests had to be evacuated on Labor Day when the navy took over. Long Beach led all of Nassau County in the sale of war bonds. October 11 was Long Beach Scrap Harvest Day. There was a test blackout on March 24 at 9:07 p.m.

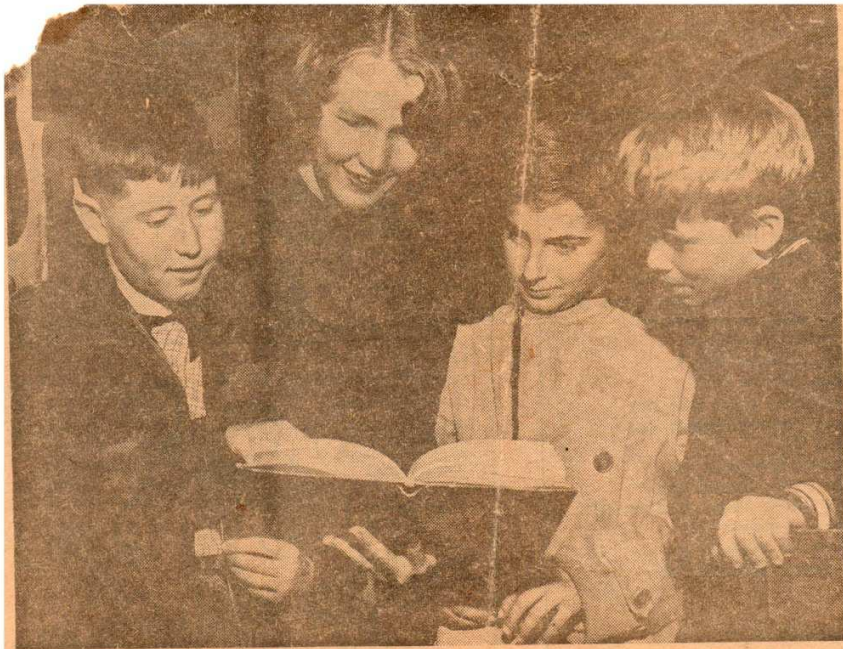
